# Reintegration and economic empowerment of Ukrainian veterans and their families

 Overview of key needs, the context for veterans and their families, and importance of integrated support

Veterans face multiple barriers - psychological, social, and economic - that limit their ability to engage in entrepreneurial activities and access available public or donor-supported economic opportunities. Recent desk research Desk research on veterans' needs and challenges.docx, reviewed internally by People in Need (PIN) in April 2025, confirms the urgency of targeted support for veteran entrepreneurship. According to a national survey, 62.89% of veterans expressed a desire to start their own business, yet only about 6–10% have accessed government or donor-supported programs due to lack of awareness, bureaucratic barriers, and limited readiness (VeteranFund, 2024; IREX, 2024).

Mental health remains a major employment barrier, with 71.14% citing psychological challenges as a top obstacle (VeteranFund, 2024). Additional studies highlight veterans' urgent need for financial literacy, business training, and local peer support networks - especially in rural communities where services are fragmented or absent (Cedos, 2024).

### Gaps and barriers - MHPSS and Protection:

Protection mainstreaming is at the core of this project design, and will underpin all activities.
